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The latest GITS survey indicates signs of recovery, but caution remains essential as improvements are primarily driven by progress in South America and Africa. Despite weak demand being a significant concern for 2 years now, signs of recovery are slowly showing. Order cancellations remain low, and order backlogs are seeing gradual positive movement, signaling a potential turning point in global operations.

As the sector rebuilds, capacity utilization might have reached an inflection point, hinting at a more stable future. The outlook for the global textile market remains slightly positive, with a balanced approach to maintaining business growth while addressing lingering challenges.

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EXECUTIVE SUMMARIES

Order intake still negative but steadily improving



The balance between "Good" and "Poor" order intake made a steady improvement for 10 consecutive months, recovering from its low in November 2023. South America and Africa stood out with the highest order intake balance.

Order backlog follows a slight positive trend



The reported average global order backlog was 2.2 months in September 2024. This marks an increase since last July and a recovery from its previous low of 1.9 months in March 2024.

Capacity utilization rates might have reached an inflection point



Global capacity utilization rate reached 75% in September 2024. This rate has been increasing since July 2024, with a notable improvement from a first low of 68% in November 2023.

Weak demand is the main concern since 2022



66% of survey participants regarded weak demand as the main concern in September 2024, unchanged from July 2024. Since business expectations are still cautiously positive, the main factor for better business will be for retailers, brands, and wholesalers to place more orders.

Order cancellations are at their lowest recorded level



A vast majority of survey respondents (63%) reported that they did not suffer from any order cancellations in September 2024. Higher levels were reported in South America.

Inventories remain average along the textile value chain



The number of companies judging inventory levels to be average remained high at 55% (slightly down from 57% in July). The apparel inventory levels at retailers and wholesalers in the USA has been rising again for a few months. It seems that the bottom has been reached.

ITMF at ABRAPA's Annual Congress 2024

From September 3-5, 2024, the Brazilian Cotton Growers' Association, ABRAPA, held its 14th annual congress in Fortaleza, Brazil. Around 3'500 participants attended this mega-event (exhibition and conference). At this year's congress ABRAPA celebrated the 25th anniversary since the foundation of the association.

Mr. Christian Schindler, Director General of ITMF, was invited to speak about the current business environment and the outlook for the global textile industry with a special focus on the cotton textile value chain. He stated that the industry is suffering since more than 1.5 years from weak demand and rising costs which have in many cases have eroded the profit margins or even led to losses.

The panel was moderated by Mr. Marcelo Duarte, Director of International Relations, ABRAPA. He stated that Brazil's cotton industry "has reinvented itself in cotton production. Today we are leaders, and this leadership brings us a lot of responsibility, because we no longer production, while at the same time keeping the quality. have to follow others, but show the way".

Mr. Ron Lawson of LOGIC ADVISORS, USA, discussed in his keynote speech the current cotton supply and demand scenario. ABRAPA-President, Mr. Alexandre Schenkel, emphasized that controlling costs is essential in cotton

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In his comments Mr. Miguel Faus, President of the National Association of Cotton Exporters (ANEA), highlighted the necessity to adapt and to take advantage of emerging market opportunities to sell cotton in a weak business environment.

Erich Trachtenberg, Executive Director of the ICAC, stated that "cotton is a natural, biodegradable fibre with the

potential to reduce poverty and conflict, especially in Africa. It brings female empowerment, since 43% of cotton producers are women". He added that cotton can mitigate climate change, as the "fibres sequester carbon. Furthermore, the crop can adapt to dry conditions, growing where other crops cannot".

ITMF at the CANAINTEX Annual Convention 2024

CANAINTEX, the Mexican Fiber, Textile, Apparel & Footwear Federation, held its annual convention from 26-29 September 2024 in Cancun, Mexico. Mr. Christian Schindler, Director General of ITMF, was invited to deliver a presentation about the current state of and outlook for the global textile value chain.

In his presentation Mr. Schindler shared the latest results of ITMF's Global Textile Industry Statistics (GTIS) as well as the data of ITMF's International Textile Machinery Shipment Statistics (ITMSS) with a specific focus on North America and Mexico. According to the results of the GTIS for September 2024 the current state of the global textile industry is still very challenging, albeit with some green shoots in different regions (South America and Africa) and segments (downstream segments). Furthermore, he highlighted that the data from the US-census for apparel inventories at retail and wholesale level seem to indicate that the reduction of inventories have bottomed out. This might lead to a higher order intake in the coming months. Looking at the

ITMSS-data Mr. Schindler concluded that the regional centre of investments was and is Asia and China in particular. While there are investment shifts within Asia, there seems to be no visible trend towards nearshoring.

According to Mr. Schindler some major trends the global textile industry is facing are:

- 1) Sourcing shifts within Asia
- 2) More sustainability & circularity requirements by brands
- 3) Increased level of regulation by governments

- 4) **Gr**owing importance of second-hand markets
- 5) Instant-Fashion by cross-border online business models

The discussions about Mexico's domestic challenges focused very much around two topics: 1) the problem of large quantities of illegal imports that are threatening the local industry's survival and 2) the "de-minimis"-rule that allows large quantities of textile products entering the markets without tariffs or checks about social and environmental compliance.
